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COVID, ICU and its consequences

In times of COVID-19 the Intensive Care Unit ist the centre of attention. But what comes after? How do COVID-19 patients come along afterwards? The conversation with the GP about the inpatient stay at the ICU hopefully helps – even if there are only slight signs or symptoms of a psychological burden. In the PICTURE-Study (DFG) we examine a short version of narrative therapy done by the GP. We were also able to provide information for the DEGAM S1-Guideline for COVID-19 and to the expert panel for longterm care of the Bavarian Health Department.

Some patients at present also shy away from the doctor appointment, but this is also changing. Our psychologist Dr. Friemel has been doing online trainings for family doctors and, although at first it was unfamiliar to do GP trainings of the NET-Therapy by telephone, it has since been very well received.

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Adults with ADHD

"I don't have patients with ADHD – or do I? Are adults with ADHD over- or maybe underdiagnosed?" Researchers are divided, when it comes to this topic. One thing is for sure - a lot of these patients are seen only by their GP. Do we recognise them as such? This is what we want to find out. Four questions concerning suicidality, regarding attempts, plans, expectations and protective factors, seem to be helpful in a family practice. The evaluation of our data from 223 patients indicates that this not be done in the form of a classic anonymous screening tool, but in the form of a conversation guide.

Research group pharmacotherapy

Prof. Dreischulte's team is becoming a research group. The statistician Marietta Rottenkolber is analysing routine data from health insurance companies for drug safety. The pharmacist Annette Härdtlein is working on our POLAR-project which examines drug-related hospitalization together with the hospital pharmacy (PD Dr. Hanna Karin Mannell). The pharmacist Christian Wendler is working on projects concerning de-prescribing: cessation of medication which increase the risk of falling.

News from the POLAR-research

The second meeting of the research groups involved in the POLAR-project (POLypharmacy, (A)drug interactions, Risks) took place on May 27th. In collaboration with the medical informatics initiative and one pharmaceutical group, which Tobias Dreischulte is a member of, it dealt with the implementation of algorithms in routine datasets for the increase of drug therapy safety in the ambulant and stationary setting. Despite the inability to meet in Leipzig due to the recent situation, 60 researchers still were able to discuss the current research progress via video conference.
