Patients with mental disorders are often seen by general practitioners who need tools to recognize and treat these disorders. Transdiagnostic therapy approaches can be efficient, which we investigate in the STARC project within the framework of the German Center for Mental Health. In our research training group POKAL, I supervise research projects dealing with suicide prevention in primary care.

Some of you have already met my doctoral students, e.g. to talk about experiences in dealing with suicidal patients or to discuss with them our newly developed questionnaire. Thank you for your support! International cooperations bring fresh input into our institute. In the past few months we have been inspired by Visiting Professor Caleb Alexander from Johns Hopkins University. In the future, Prof. Sebastian Schneeweiss from Harvard University will join our team as a cooperation partner and expert in pharmacoepidemiology and pharmacoeconomics.

As a team, we also strive for sporting successes: the institute participates in the "Stadtradeln 2023" (City Cycling 2023), with the goal of saving 0.5 tons of CO₂. Moreover, we take on the challenge 'Master of of the Olympic Lake' and compete in the dragon boat with TUM for the title. This summer we also have a cultural highlight: we celebrate the 10th anniversary of the "Stiftung Allgemeinmedizin" (The Primary Health Care Foundation). 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DZPG: A new national health center

Munich, with the LMU, TUM and the University of Augsburg, Helmholtz Center and Max-Planck-Institute, is the location of the German Center for Mental Health (DZPG / Berlin, Bochum, Halle/Jena, Heidelberg, Tübingen). In the future, research on the major mental disorders will be bundled here. For the first time, general medicine is represented in such an interdisciplinary structure of national health research. Psychological stress: Symptoms instead of diagnoses?

The first point of contact for mental health issues is usually the general practitioner. Could an approach be more suitable that is not diagnosis-oriented but symptom-oriented and that offers cross-disease (transdiagnostic) therapy? As part of the DZPG (see above), we want to develop and investigate such approaches within the STARC project (STructured, first-Aid geneRic, psychologiCal interventions).

Panic disorder diagnostic tool

The prevalence of panic disorders in primary care patients in Germany is 5 percent. To support general practitioners, we have validated the German version of the OASIS (Overall Anxiety Severity and Impairment Scale; 5 items). The psychometric performance was found to be good; thus, the OASIS can be used in everyday practice to identify these patients (Publication: Hiller, Sientific Reports 2023).

How primary care physicians quickly recognize ADHD in adults

Attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) is not only common in children, but also in adults (ADHD) (worldwide: 2.8 percent, Germany: 3.1 percent). In order to recognize them, general practitioners need valid and time-effective screening tools. Based on our literature review, we recommend: WURS (Wender Utah Rating Scale-self-assessment based on 21 items and 4 control items concerning the presence of ADHD at age 8-10 years; CAARS-Conner's Adult ADHD Rating Scale & ASRS Adult ADHD Self-Report Scale).

Extracting data from natural language

In electronic health records, only a portion of the clinically relevant content is available in a structured form for analysis. The project GeMTeX (German Medical Text Corpus) was recently launched as part of the Medical Informatics Initiative (MI-I). The goal is to compile a comprehensive, anonymized collection of German clinical texts from the information systems of six university hospitals in order to use unstructured data (such as doctors' letters) for research purposes. Good doctor-patient-relationship also helps with ITS stress

Patients who suffer from PTSD-like symptoms after intensive care treatment rely on a good relationship with their primary care physician. This is especially true in the context of treatment approaches that focus on talking through the stressful event (narrative exposure therapy - NET) (Sanftenberg BMC Primary Care 2023). The use of antidepressants has increased worldwide, especially in older patients with multimorbidity and multimedication. There is a lack of guidelines for discontinuation. Experts have now identified clinical situations that require a timely review of medication. These should support physicians in making decisions and minimize the risk. Dealing with suicidal patients

When we recognize suicidal tendencies, interview guidelines can help us to deal with the topic appropriately. In order to develop such a guideline, we ask general practitioners about their experiences with suicidal patients. In addition, we search the scientific literature for low-threshold interventions for suicidality or suicidal ideation in order to make a recommendation for general practitioners.

Practice-based research practice networks RESPoNsE

In addition to the Bavarian research practice network (BayFoNet), five other regional research practice networks have been established nationwide. The VeCo project is retrospectively examining the care situation of people not suffering from Covid under pandemic conditions: At what points did underuse occur? Was there a reassessment of what was really needed?

Masterplan 2020: Implementation planned for October 2027

The German Federal Ministry of Health (BMG) presented a revised draft of the Masterplan 2020 this April. The aim is to bring medical training closer to practice and to strengthen general medicine. The block internship in general medicine will be upgraded: students will now complete 5 weeks of internship in three sections starting in the 2nd - 4th semesters, also in rural practices. An outpatient elective is also being introduced in the practical year (PJ); in the future, there will be four PJ quarters, including an outpatient elective, and general medicine will become a compulsory subject in the 3rd state examination alongside internal medicine and surgery.
